Respecting First Nationals Cultural Diversity in Canada

Why the meeting with the First Nations of Canada?

Not recognizing the cultural diversity of Aboriginal Peoples in Canada is one of the most common mistakes non-Aboriginal people make when engaging with Aboriginal communities and visiting Canada.

Justin Trudeau (Prime Minister of Canada)

"Every year, we [...] recognize the fundamental contributions that First Nations, Inuit, and the Métis Nation have made to the identity and culture of all Canadians. **The** history, art, traditions, and cultures of Indigenous Peoples have shaped our past, and continue to shape who we are today."

"No relationship is more important to Canada than the relationship with Indigenous Peoples. Our Government is working together with Indigenous Peoples to build a nation-to-nation, Inuit-Crown, government-to-government relationship – one based on respect, partnership, and recognition of rights.

"We are determined to make a real difference in the lives of Indigenous Peoples – by closing socio-economic gaps, supporting greater self-determination, and establishing opportunities to work together on shared priorities."



His knowledge of protocols for men and their roles and responsibility is one of respect for gender relations.
